THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26, 1811.

THE House met.—Present the same members as on yesterday.—The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill separating the business of the court of chancery and authorising the holding sessions of the said court for the Eastern Shore, and for other purposes; the supplement to an act to ascertain the allowance of members of the General Assembly, electors of senate, and electors of president and vice-president of the United States; and the message proposing to close the session were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr Bowles ordered, that the bill to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland and for the extension of the several charters of the several banks in the city of Baltimore, have a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. L. Duvall delivers a petition from Jehu Chandler, printer to the state, praying a further remuneration for his services; which was read and referred to Messrs. L. Duvall, Bowles, and Pechin.

Mr. Marriott delivers a petition from William Davis, of Anne Arundel county, praying to be supported out of the poor's-house; which was read and referred to Messrs. Marriott, Z. Duvall and Belt.

Mr. Howard delivers the following resolution :

Resolved. That the treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby directed and required to pay to John J. Jacob, a meritorious officer in the revolutionary war, or to his order, in quarterly payments, a sum of money equal to the half-pay of a lieutenant, as a compensation for those services by which his country has been so essentially benefited.
