

“And be it enacted, That such of the counties of this state as have not heretofore received a donation from the state, for the encouragement of learning, shall receive the sum of 500 dollars in addition to the sums apportioned to them by the act for the purpose of endowing academies?”

So it was determined in the negative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to authorise the levy court of Washington county to appoint commissioners to alter, straighten, open and amend a road therein mentioned, endorsed, “will pass;” ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the benefit of Moses Ruth, of Queen Anne’s county, endorsed, “will pass with the proposed amendments;” which amendments were read, agreed to and the bill ordered to be engrossed; also, the bill to tax bank-stock and other monied institutions in the state. The bill for the benefit of the inrant children of George Slacum. The supplement to the act for the relief of Dominick Galt and John Thomas; and the bill for the relief of Andrew Borge, an insolvent debtor, severally endorsed, “will not pass” Also a bill entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to the district of Columbia, toward the city of Washington; and a bill entitled, An act further supplementary to the act for establishing a company for opening and extending the navigation of the river Potomac, which were severally read.

Mr. A. Jones delivers a petition from Col. Edward Tillard, of Montgomery county, a revolutionary officer, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. A. Jones, Evans and C. Dorsey.
