The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of the College of Medicine of Maryland. A bill entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Prince George's county to open a road in said county; and a bill entitled, An act for the relief of John McKenzie, of the city of Baltimore, severally passed by that house Dec. 12, 1811; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill entitled, An act to pay the civil list, and other expenses of civil government. The bill entitled, An act to alter the time of the meeting of the General Assembly of this state, and for other purposes. The bill entitled, An act for the relief of Levin Carey, of Worcester county; and the bill entitled, An act for the benefit of the vestry of St. George's Parish, in Harford county, were severally read the second time and will pass.

The resolution in favor of Henry Reading, was read the second time and assented to.

The bill entitled, An act for the appointment by the people of the justices of the levy courts in the several counties of this state, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall this bill pass?
