

The report on the petition of John Murray and Josias Stevenson was read the second time, amended and concurred in, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

The bill entitled, an act authorising John Newton, late sheriff and collector of Dorchester county to complete his collections, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Reynolds delivers a petition from Sarah B. Parker, of Calvert county, praying that she may be authorised to dispose of certain real and personal property, notwithstanding her coverture; and a petition from Priscilla Wilson, containing a similar prayer; which were severally read and referred to Messrs. Reynolds, Wilson and Turner.

On motion by Mr. J. H. Thomas, *Ordered*, That the governor and council be requested to communicate to this house whether any and what applications have been made by the executive of this state to the general government for protection, or any information they may have of such applications made to the general government in behalf of any portion of the citizens of this state, and what answers have been returned thereto.

Mr. Francis M. Hall delivers a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to make a turnpike road from the District of Columbia to the city of Baltimore; which was read.

Mr. Taney delivers a petition from Wenman Ramsey, of Calvert county, praying that the levy court may be authorised to levy a sum of money for his support; which was read and referred to Messrs. Taney, Turner and Blake.

Mr. Wilson delivers a bill entitled, an act to lay out and make a public road in Worcester county; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill entitled, an act authorising the drawing of a lottery or lotteries for the benefit of the University of Maryland, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Barney from the committee delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Araminta Sipple, beg leave to report, that they have taken the same into their most serious consideration, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petition ought not to be granted, and that the petitioner have leave to withdraw the same.

Mr. Leconte delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Samuel Mills, of Dorchester county, beg leave to report, that they know of no circumstances which should authorise the interference of the legislature as prayed in his petition, which would not operate to justify the removal entirely of the disability of a feme covert to make any disposition of her property by last will and testament; they therefore recommend that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition.

The bill entitled, an act to authorise Gustavus R. A. Brown and Caroline, his wife, of Prince William county, in the state of Virginia, to convey certain property in the precincts of Baltimore city in Baltimore county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Barney delivers a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for opening and extending Aisquith street, in the eastern precincts of Baltimore, which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Burgess delivers a petition from James Butcher and other securities of John B. Hacker & Richard E. Mr. Rogerson delivers a petition from Charles Sewall, Junr. an officer in the revolutionary war, praying additional compensation for his services; which was read and referred to the standing committee on soldiers' petitions.

Mr. Belt delivers a petition from Gassaway Watkins, formerly an officer in the revolutionary war, praying further compensation for his services; which was read and referred to the standing committee on soldiers' petitions.
