

The bill, entitled, a supplement to the act, entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-de Grace; and the bill, entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled, an act to open and extend Queen street, in the city of Baltimore, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, the following resolution was read, assented to, and sent to the senate:

*Resolved*, That the examiner general shall, on oath, lay before the next general Assembly, the amount of fees that he may receive in the present year; and the treasurer of the Western Shore, hereafter pay to him, or his order, such sum in addition to said fees as shall amount to eight hundred dollars for the present year.

Mr. M'Mahon delivers a bill, entitled, an act for the benefit of Robert Armstrong, of Alleghany county. Which was read.

On motion by Mr. Wilson, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, an act relating to cases in the court of appeals. Ordered, that Messrs. Wilson, J. H. Thomas and Kilgour, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Wilson delivers a petition from the trustees of the Union academy of Snow Hill, praying that their charter of incorporation may be repealed, and that a law may pass to incorporate them under a different form. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, Handy and Quinton.

The bill, entitled, an act for the benefit of Ann Morton, a minor of Caroline county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Randall from the committee delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Isaac M'Pherson, and others, praying to have a law passed to shut up part of an old road in Baltimore county, known by the name of the Rolling road, have taken the same into their serious consideration, also the petition counter thereto, and after mature deliberation thereon, report, that they are of opinion, the said part of a road ought not to be shut up.

Which was read the first and second time by special order and concurred in.

The bill, entitled, an act to regulate the proceedings of sheriffs and constables in certain cases, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Lecompte delivers a petition from William Potter, of Caroline county, praying remuneration for certain sums of money advanced for the maintenance and transportation of certain British deserters. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Lecompte, Wilson and Kilgour.

Mr. Taney delivers a memorial of the justices of the Levy court of Frederick county, praying that they may be authorised to provide for the erection of a new jail. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Taney, J. H. Thomas and J. Thomas.

The bill, entitled, an act to incorporate the Franklin manufacturing company of Maryland, was read the second time, passed and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. M'Mahon, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, an act to establish and incorporate a company under the name of the Cumberland manufacturing and insurance company of Alleghany. Ordered, that Messrs. M'Mahon, J. H. Thomas, Van Horn, Wilson, Hilleary, Lantz, and Tomlinson, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Beall delivers a petition from John Gassaway, late a captain in the revolutionary war, praying compensation for his services. Which was read and referred to Messrs. Beall, Howard and Duvall.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, Ordered that the militia accountant for the Western Shore, be, and he is hereby directed to lay before this house all the accounts and claims by him liquidated since his appointment to office, likewise the names of persons or corps, if any whose claims may remain unpaid or unadjusted with the causes of such delay.

The bill, entitled, an act to change the place of holding the election in the fourth election district in Alleghany county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Kilgour the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate.

We propose with the concurrence of your house to proceed on Thursday the 5th instant, to an election of two directors on the part of the state, for the Union Bank of Maryland; two for the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore; one for the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore; two for the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, at Annapolis; two for the Branch of said bank at Easton; two for the Hagerstown Bank; and one for the Elkton Bank of Maryland.

The report on the petition of the trustees of Saint Peter's free school, was read the second time, concurred in, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

Mr. Van Horn from the committee appointed on that part of the communication of the executive which relates to the finances of the state, delivers a bill, entitled, an act relating to the several banks within this state. Which was read.

The bill, entitled, an act to alter and repeal such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state, as relates to the division of Alleghany county, into election districts, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Van Horn, Ordered, that the bill from the senate, entitled, an act relative to justices of the peace, and for other purposes, be committed to Messrs. Van Horn, Wilson, Kell, Mason and Blake.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill, entitled, an act to authorise the clerk of Alleghany county, to record the deed therein mentioned; and the bill, entitled, an act for the relief of sundry naturalized citizens, and for other purposes, severally endorsed, "will not pass."
