On motion of Mr. Williams, the following resolutions were read the first and second time by special order, assented to and sent to the house of delegate by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, December 13, 1814.

*Resolved*, That it shall be the duty of the printer of the state to print two hundred copies of the laws and resolutions of the general assembly hereafter to be published, on fine, clear, white paper, of royal octavo size, and with a good legible type, which copies shall be distributed among the members of the legislative, executive and judicial departments, in the manner provided by law.

*Resolved*, That the votes and proceedings of the general assembly hereafter to be published, shall be printed in royal octavo, on a clear, white paper, and with a good legible type, copies of which shall be distributed in the manner provided by an act of assembly passed at November session, seventeen hundred and ninety, chapter fifty one.

*Resolved*, That the printer of the state is entitled to receive for his services and expenditures, out of the treasury, a reasonable and increased annual salary.

*Resolved*, That the resolutions passed at each session of the general assembly be recorded with the laws of the session.

Mr. Hebb from the committee delivers a bill entitled, an act relative to justices of the peace and for other purposes. Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate having previously qualified agreeably to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a council to the governor; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned and reported, that Alexander C. Magruder and Samuel Ridout had fifty-one votes each, Thomas G. Addison and John Murray forty-nine votes each, William H. Ward forty-four votes, James Butcher and Henry Ashton twenty-four votes each, Thomas W. Hall and Reverdy Ghiselin twenty-three votes each, James Nabb twenty-two votes, Charles W. Hanson two votes, and Thomas G. Adams and James Lloyd one vote each. Whereupon it is declared in the senate that Alexander C. Magruder, Samuel Ridout, Thomas G. Addison, John Murray and William H. Ward, having had a majority of votes, are duly elected the council to the governor.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Sarah Clarkson of Kent county. A bill entitled, an act to lay out and open a road from Jacob Fieser's tavern to John Tuoroos saw mill in Frederick county. A bill entitled, an act authorising the trustees of the Roman Catholic church in the city of Baltimore to purchase a lot to be used as a burying ground, and a bill entitled, an act supplementary to an act entitled, an act for the relief of John Messler and David Rinehart, trustees of James Farquhar of Frederick county, passed at November session eighteen hundred and twelve, severally passed by that house December 13, 1814. Which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Levin Winder, the governor elect, attending in the senate room, ordered, that Messrs. Stephen and Hawkins inform the house of delegates that Levin Winder, the governor elect, is attending in the senate room to qualify as governor of the state of Maryland, and request their attendance.

The speaker, attended by the members of the house of delegates, appeared in the senate room, and in *Vide* qualified as governor before the president of the senate, in the presence of both houses, by taking the oaths directed by the constitution and form of government, the oath of office prescribed by law, and by taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, and also by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion.

The senate adjourns until to morrow morning 9 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, December 14.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion, *Resolved*, that the senate proceed immediately to the election of a member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. William M. Creery.

The senate proceeded accordingly to said election, and after qualifying agreeably to the constitution and form of government, the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, on examination thereof it appeared that Alexander M. Kim was unanimously elected. Whereupon it is declared in the senate that Alexander M. Kim is unanimously elected a member of the senate.

The clerk of the council delivers the following communication from the executive, covering the documents therein referred to.
