On motion by Mr. E. K. Wilson, the following message was read:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, January 29, 1816.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We cannot agree to the request in your message of Saturday, to re-consider the bill entitled, an act to authorise the president of the United States to erect toll gates on the Western road, laid out and made by the United States, leading from Cumberland across the mountains towards the river Ohio, and for other purposes.

It will certainly be time enough to consider this question when the road is completed—at present we can only say that the road is a great national object and ought to be made & kept in repair at the expense of the nation. This is the first instance and will perhaps be the last for years to come, that the people of Alleghany will receive any local advantage from an expenditure of public money.

Other more favored sections of the country are in the daily enjoyment of money from the public coffers circulated among them.

We pass by the insinuation in your message, that this house will by a refusal to pass the bill subject Maryland to the reproach and just indignation of the American people. We shall content ourselves with a disavowal that we are actuated by a spirit of parsimony and selfishness, or a disposition to derive a disproportionate share of the advantages of an important public measure without contributing its support or aiding in its preservation.

The bill entitled, an act to continue in force the acts of assembly which would expire with the present session, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill entitled, an act for the relief of Zachariah M'Cubbin, senior, of Montgomery county, was read the second time and the question put, shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The amendment proposed by the senate to the bill entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled, an act to fix and regulate the quality of silver plate manufactured and sold or offered for sale in the city of Baltimore, was read the second time and dissented from.
