The senate met.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:  
BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, December 11, 1815.

*Gentlemen of the Senate,*

We have received your message proposing to go into the election of the governor for this state at six o'clock in lieu of the hour named by this house and have acceded to the same.

Which was read.

The senate having previously qualified agreeably to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a governor; the ballot box being prepared the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned and reported that Charles Ridgely, (of Hampton,) had forty-seven votes and Robert Bowie forty-five votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate that Charles Ridgely, (of Hampton,) having had a majority of votes, is duly elected governor of Maryland.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

TUESDAY, December 12.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion of Mr. N. Williams, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act in addition to an act entitled, an act for amending and reducing into system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons. Ordered that Messrs. N. Williams, Stephen and Hebb be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

On motion of Mr. L. Hollingsworth, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, an act relating to streets in the city and precincts of Baltimore. Ordered, that Messrs. L. Hollingsworth, Johnson and N. Williams be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Holbrook presented two petitions from John Boon, of Caroline county, praying a law to authorise the sale of certain real estate therein mentioned. Which were read and referred to Messrs. Holbrook, Nabb and Brown to consider and report thereon.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, an act to confirm the proceedings of the levy court of Frederick county and for other purposes. A bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the benefit of the widow and infant children of Thomas Gibson, late of Frederick county, deceased severally passed by that house December 11, 1815; and the following message:

Lecompt and Thomas in conjunction with the gentlemen that may be named by you to count the ballots.
