### WEDNESDAY, January 13, 1819.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, A supplement to an act entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Montgomery county; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate a company under the name of The Hydrant Company of Port Tobacco; a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of John M. Quinn, of the city of Baltimore; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Julian Cunningham, of Frederick county; a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower Samuel Owings, of Richard, to execute a conveyance for the land therein mentioned; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. A bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of James P. Boyd, of the city of Baltimore; which was read the first, second, and third time, by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to internal improvements, was read the second, and by special order the third time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in this state, was read the second time.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the judges of the court of appeals to extend the time of their sessions on the eastern shore, was read the third time by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Hughlett presented the petition of Thomas Wilson; which was read, and referred to Messrs. Hughlett, Cresap and Parnham, to consider and report thereon. Also the petition of Elizabeth Morgan; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hughlett, Carmichael and Magruder, to consider and report thereon.

The clerk of the council delivers a communication from the executive relative to turnpike roads; which was read.

Mr. Carmichael from the committee reported a bill, entitled, An act for the better regulation of appeals from the several orphans courts in this state; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Carmichael, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to extend the powers of the several county courts in this state in relation to changing the venue in civil cases. Ordered, That Messrs. Carmichael, Magruder and Parnham, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Francis E. Monk's, of Harford county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to prevent the passing of bank notes within this state, at a rate below their nominal value, was read the third time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

### THURSDAY, January 14, 1819.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The president laid before the senate the following letter from the honourable Edward H. Calvert.

The bill passed amended, and was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.
