Mr. President, Messrs. Carmichael, Emerson, Gale, Parnham, West.—6.

So it was determined in the negative; and the bill returned to the house of delegates by the clerk. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, An act relating to the records of the office of the register of wills in Queen-Anne's county; a bill, entitled, An act to establish a new election district in Baltimore county; a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act providing for the appointment of an attorney general and of district attorneys in the several judicial districts of this state, and for Baltimore city court; and a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the recording of a deed from Benjamin Dulany, and Elizabeth his wife, to Daniel F. Dulany and William Herbert, junior; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. And a resolution in favour of Wilfred Drury's administrators; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Levin Craig, infant child and heir of Margaret Craig, late of Dorchester county, deceased, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will pass with the proposed amendments, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. Amendments proposed: 1. Strike out the word "orphans" 1st line 1st section, and insert "county." After the word "county" 3d line 1st section, insert "to appoint a guardian." 3. Insert before "Margaret" 5th line 1st section "infant child and heir of the said." 4. Strike out the word "said" before the word "orphans" 1st line 2d section. 5. After the word "court" 1st line 2d section, insert the words "of Dorchester county." 6. Strike out the word "they" 1st line 2d section, and insert "the county court." Strike out "make" in 2d line same section and insert "decree." 8. Strike out the word "have" last line 3d section. 9. Strike out "orphans" 1st line 4th section and insert "county." The bill, entitled, An act to extend the powers of the several county courts of this state in relation to changing the venue in civil cases, was read the third time, and the question being put, Shall the bill pass? The bill, entitled, An act incorporating the Baltimore Lying-in and Foundling Hospital, was read the second time by special order and ordered to lie on the table. The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Somerset county, was read the third time and will not pass, sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Mary Louisa Hall of the city of Baltimore, was received from the house of delegates with an amendment, which amendment was read the third time and assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Stephen Lewis of Worcester county, was received from the house of delegates, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment," which amendment was read and assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills. A bill, entitled, An act more effectually to protect the right of property in corn, and in other things adhering to the freehold; a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the speedy recovery of small debts out of court, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. The bill, entitled, An act authorising Thomas J. H. Eccleston to convey a certain house and lot situate in the town of Cambridge unto Thomas Lockerman of Dorchester county, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The clerk of the council delivers a communication from the executive, enclosing a resolution from the Governor of the state of Vermont; which were read and referred to the house of delegates. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following bills: A bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to direct descents; a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate Salisbury Academy in Somerset county; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. Also a resolution respecting the laws, endorsed "by the house of delegates read the second time and assented to with the proposed amendments," which amendments were read and assented to. Ordered to be engrossed.

Amendments proposed: 1. Strike out from the word "of" 2d. line 1st section, to the end of the section, and insert "May next" if any free person shall take and carry away, or pull or cut and sever, with intent to take and carry away, any tobacco plants, or Indian corn, standing, growing, ripening, or upon the stalk, and growing in any field, lot, garden or other inclosure, belonging to, or in the possession of any inhabitant within this state, of the value of twelve and an half cents or more, every
