The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the better regulation of the militia of the city of Baltimore, was read the third time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. 1. Strike out from the title to the end of the 7th section, and insert "And be it enacted, by the general assembly of Maryland, that the last annual company parade prescribed to the militia by the act aforesaid, be and the same is hereby dispensed with. And be it enacted. That appeals from the judgment of magistrates in all cases of fines under the said act, shall be allowed to the party fined as well as to the state, as in the cases of small debts." 2. At the end of the bill add the following: "And be it enacted, that the officers of the fourteenth brigade be, and they are hereby entitled to all the privileges and immunities which the officers of the third brigade now enjoy."
