

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

The bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government, was read the second and third time by special order and will pass. Severally sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act prescribing the manner of instituting suits on bonds, notes and other sealed instruments, where there are more obligors than one, was read the second and third time by special order and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for amending and reducing into a system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors and administrators, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, was read the third time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed: 1. Strike out from the word "estate" 9th line 2d section to the word "provided," 6th line 2d page. 2. In the 7th line 2d page strike out the word "also." 3. In the 8th line 3d section strike out the word "not" 4. Strike out the last section.

The resolution in favour of Jehu Chandler was read the first, and by special order the second and third time, and dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to the auditor, was read the second and third time by special order, and will pass with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. After the word "state" 4th line, insert "in the penalty heretofore required," Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of the late auditor, was read the second and third time by special order, and assented to. The resolution in favour of Richard Lockerman, was read the second and third time by special order, and dissented from. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of the treasurer of the eastern shore, was read the third time and dissented from. The resolution relative to the public arms was read the second and by special order the third time and assented to. The bill, entitled, An act to prevent geese and swine from going at large in the town of Upper Marlborough, in Prince George's county, was read the second and third time by special order and will pass.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to the collection of public debts, was read the second, and by special order the third time, and assented to. The bill, entitled, An act to avoid suits at law, was read the second and third time and will pass. Severally sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolutions in favour of St Peter's School; relative to sale of stock; relative to publishing a law; relative to the public circle; relative to academies; relative to the subscription for stock; and in favour of the Potomac company; of the securities of Thomas Pollard; of the directors of the Penitentiary; relative to the Cumberland bank road; relative to the Union Bank of Maryland; in favour of Thomas Fairfax; were severally read the second and third time by special order and assented to.

The resolution in favour of the commissioners of the school fund for Baltimore county was read the second, and by special order the third time, and assented to with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. After the word "Baltimore" insert "to the Orphaline Charity School."
