

order a second time and laid on the table; also a bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Cambridge in Dorchester county, and to establish and regulate a market in said town; which was read the first time and laid on the table; also a bill relating to a landing place on Wicomico River; which was read the first, and by special order a second time and laid on the table; also a bill entitled, An act authorizing John Murray of Baltimore county to collect the damages allowed to him for the extension of Asquith street through his ground; which was read the first & by special order a second time and laid on the table; also a bill entitled, An act supplementary to the act entitled, An act for the benefit of the infant children of Gerard Briscoe, late of Charles county, deceased, passed in the year 1813, chapter 152; which was read the first time and laid on the table; also a bill in favor of James Beacham and Sarah his wife; which was read the first time and laid on the table; and returns a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Robert H. Goldsborough and Edward N. Hambleton, as securities of Allen Bowie, late sheriff of Talbot county, endorsed 'will pass;' also delivered a bill entitled, An act authorizing the laying off ground and extending thereon the public wharf at New-Town in Worcester county; which was read the first and by special order a second time and laid on the table.

The resolution in favor of Adam Ott was read a third time, assented to and sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Henry Carberry, was read a third time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Henry Wilmot, was read a third time, dissented from and sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of Benjamin Uncles, was read a third time, dissented from and sent to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Joshua Guyton; which was read the first time and laid on the table; also An act to repeal An act of the present session; which was read the first time and laid on the table; also a bill to incorporate the savage manufacturing company, and a bill entitled, An act for the relief of William Coleman, of Montgomery county; which was read the first time and laid on the table; and returns the bill concerning the Shepherd's Town Bridge Company, endorsed 'will pass with the proposed amendment;' which amendment was read and laid on the table.

The resolution in favor of Isaac Holland, was read the third time and dissented from; the resolution in favor of Sarah Wyndham, was read a third time and assented to.

The resolution in favor of Joshua Guyton, was read the second and third time by special order and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates returned the bill for the benefit of William Harness, with the following message:

The resolution in favor of Anthony Davis, was read a third time and dissented from and sent to the house of delegates.

The resolution in favor of William Sewell, was read a third time, assented to and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill for the relief of William Coleman of Montgomery county, and Edward H. C. Wilson, was read by special order a second and third time and will not pass.

The supplement to the act taxing or licensing certain dealers in lottery tickets and others, and the bill laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods and for other purposes, were sent to the house of delegates.

The bill to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned, was read the second and third time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The senate adjourned until half past 6 o'clock.

POST MERIDIEM, Half past 6 o'clock.

The senate met. Present the same members as in the morning.

The additional supplement to the act for the better regulation of the militia of the city of Baltimore, was read a third time. Mr. McKim moved to strike out the fifth section, and the question was put, and determined in the affirmative. On motion of Mr. McKim, the question was put, will the senate strike out the fifteenth section? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

AFFIRMATIVE—Messrs Stuart, (president) Dickinson, Johnson, Kent, McKim—5.

NEGATIVE—Messrs Brownley, Cockey, Claude, Wootton—4. So it was determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of Thomas Pollard's securities; which was read the first time and laid on the table; and returns the resolution relative to the school fund in Prince George's county, endorsed 'dissented from'. Also delivered a bill for the relief of Thomas C. Smith, of Dorchester county; a bill for the benefit of James Simmonds, of Calvert county; a bill for the benefit of Nathaniel Wattles, of the town of Alexandria, District of Columbia; a bill to lay out and make public a road leading from Bean-town, in Charles county, to Mat-tawoman swamp, between the plantations of Theodore Dyer and Eleanor Townsend, where the said swamp divides Charles and Prince George's counties; which were severally read the first, and
