

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a resolution in favor of James Barnes, of the city of Baltimore; a resolution in favor of Zachariah Roberts, of the city of Baltimore; a resolution in favor of Sarah Smith, of the city of Baltimore; a resolution in favor of John Smith, of Prince-George's county; a resolution in favor of Margaret Hamilton, of the city of Baltimore; which were severally read the first time and referred to the committee on revolutionary pensions; also a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco; a bill, entitled, An act to establish a patrol in Calvert county; a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Adelaide V. Lowe, of Frederick county; and a bill, entitled, An act to change the name of David Davis Pagett, Kent county, to that of David Davis; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

On motion by Mr. Wootton, leave was given to bring in a bill to be entitled, An act for the relief of George Gingle, of Montgomery county; and it was ordered that Messrs. Wootton, Quinton and Bowie, should be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Bowie appeared in the senate.

Mr. Price from the committee, to whom was referred the bill for the benefit of William Workman, of Allegany county, reported, that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that the bill ought to pass with the following amendments, viz.

1st. At the end of the bill add the following proviso, "provided, that nothing herein contained shall operate to impair or divest any right, title or interest, which the heirs at law of the said Andrew Workman, or any other person or persons, may have or claim in and to the said lot of land."

2d. In the endorsement of the bill, strike out the word "relief" and insert "benefit."

3d. In the second line of the first section, strike out the words, from and after the passage of this act." Which amendments were read and assented to; and the bill being read a second, and by special order a third time, was passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Price was appointed one of the joint committee in the place of Mr. Chambers, to ascertain whether any and what amount of money may be necessary to repair or refurnish the accommodations at the government-house;

On motion the bill for the relief of Adelaide V. Lowe of Frederick county, was referred to Messrs. Chambers, Cockey and Claude.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of George Yeaman, of the city of Baltimore; was read a third time, and the question was put, Shall the bill pass? Determined in the affirmative.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

TUESDAY, January 28, 1823.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the relief of George Yeaman, of the city of Baltimore, was returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Winder presented the memorial of William Read, and others, of the 2d Franklin Beneficial Society of Maryland; which was read and referred to Messrs. Winder, Miller and Brownley.

Also the petition of Lucy Washington, praying for a divorce; which was read and referred to Messrs. Chambers, Cockey and Claude.

The president laid before the senate communications from the registers of wills of Caroline and Dorchester counties, in obedience to the order of the senate of the 14th instant; which were read and laid on the table.

The resolution in favour of Colin M'Kenzie, was read a second time, and referred to Messrs. Winder, Miller and Orrell.

The supplement to the act incorporating into one the several acts relating to constables fees, was referred to Messrs. Brownley, Cockey and Winder.

The bill to repeal an act to alter, change and repeal, such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state, as relate to the division of St. Mary's county in four election districts, passed at December session 1806, and confirmed at November session 1807, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message:

Also a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Thomas J. Perry, late of Allegany county; a bill entitled An act to regulate the pay of the justices of the orphans court of Somersét county; a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relates to the division of Anne-Arundel county into five separate election districts; & a bill, entitled, An act giving jurisdiction to justices of the peace in trespasses for killing, wounding, or otherwise injuring horses, black cattle, hogs and sheep; which were severally read the first time and laid on the table.

And returns the bill to ascertain and establish a divisional line, between Anne-Arundel and Calvert counties, endorsed, "amendments read and assented to." And it was ordered to be engrossed.
