

By the House of Delegates, March 3d, 1827.  
Gentlemen of the Senate,

The bill to elect the senate by the people, has been returned to this house endorsed, 'will not pass;' but by the printed journal of the senate, this day laid upon the desks of this house, we observe that the bill has passed your honorable body, there being only one dissenting vote; we therefore presume the clerk has made a mistake in endorsing the bill, and return it to you, to be corrected.

Mr. Heath from the committee, to whom was referred the bill to incorporate the *Maryland Savings Institution*, reported the same with the following amendment, viz.— At the end of the bill add the two following additional sections. "And be it enacted, that nothing in this act contained shall be held or construed to authorise the company incorporated by this act, to do any act or acts inconsistent with the privileges secured to the existing banking institutions in the city of Baltimore, by the act of eighteen hundred and thirteen, chapter one hundred and twenty-one and twenty-two, and by the act of eighteen hundred and twenty-one chapter one hundred and thirty-one, or by any other act or acts of assembly in force."

And be it enacted, that this act shall continue and be in force, only for the term of twenty-five years. Which amendment was read and assented to.

On motion, the said bill was then further amended by striking out the word, "perpetual," in the 15th line of the 1st section, and by inserting after the word "of" in the 6th line of the 2d section, the words "such meetings."

The bill was then read a second time.

On motion, the bill to provide for the valuation and condemnation of a lot of land, at the mouth of Cambridge creek in Dorchester county, for the erection and establishment of a tide mill, the same being the order of the day was postponed.

Mr. Harrison from the committee, reported a bill to legitimate Robert Delahay, Henry Delahay, the younger and James Delahay of Talbot county, the children of Henry Delahay and Susan Millington, which was read the first time.

Mr. Forrest from the committee, to whom was referred the bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Hester Whitaker, and others the heirs and representatives of Alexander Whitaker, of Montgomery county deceased, reported favourable upon the said bill.—The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.
