Determined in the affirmative, and the bill was sent to the house of delegates for its concurrence.

Mr. Kennedy from the committee reported a bill entitled an act respecting naturalization, which was read the first time and ordered to be printed.

On motion the bill directing the manner in which the Free School fund in Anne-Arundel county shall be applied, was referred to Messrs. Heath, Lloyd and Kennedy.

The senate proceeded to the consideration of the resolution from the house of delegates, respecting the claim of the surviving officers and soldiers of the revolution, the resolution being read,

Mr. Dennis moved to postpone the resolution until Wednesday the 30th inst: and the question was put and determined in the negative.

Mr. Forrest moved to amend the resolution by striking out the words "that justice to which they are respectively entitled," for the purpose of inserting the words, the measure of justice to which they may be entitled," which amendment was read and assented to.

Mr. Kennedy moved to refer the resolution as amended to a select committee, and the question was put and determined in the negative.
