Resolved by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, that the mayor be, and he is hereby requested to have a copy of the foregoing resolution transmitted to the governor of the state of Maryland, and the president of the senate and speaker of the house of delegates of the legislature of Maryland, at Annapolis, forthwith.

The said communication and resolutions were read, and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, the question was put, "will the senate re-consider the vote they passed on a message offered by Mr. Kennedy on the 9th of January last, in relation to the Baltimore Hospital;" determined in the negative.

Mr. Heath asked and obtained leave to withdraw from the consideration of the senate, the petition of Mr. Hays of Baltimore, praying the passage of a law to empower him to convey a lot of ground in the city of Baltimore. The relief prayed for in the said petition having been refused by the senate.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

Wednesday, 6th February, 1828.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday.

The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Nelson from the committee, reported a bill entitled, an act to authorise Lucy T. Gwynn of Frederick county, to remove negro James into this state, which was read the first, and by special order a second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading. The said bill having been engrossed, was read a third time by special order and sent to the house of delegates.
