

such returns of the trustees, commissioners, and other authorities of the several colleges, academies and schools, receiving funds or donations from the state, as he has received, made in obedience to resolution No. 49 of December session 1824.

On motion of Mr. Herbert, the communication yesterday received by the senate, from the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, enclosing certain resolutions of that body, proposing to vest any title or claim which the city of Baltimore may at present have to the Maryland or city hospital, in the state of Maryland, was referred to a select committee. The President named Messrs. Herbert, Thomas and Kennedy, to constitute the said committee.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, the senate proceeded to take up and consider the order of the day, being the bill entitled, an act to provide for the making the several turnpike roads, and for the extension of the charters of the several Banks therein mentioned; on proceeding to the third reading of the said bill, Mr. Forrest moved to amend the same by striking out the following words, commencing in the 9th line of the 4th section, to wit: "Then their charters shall not be extended as aforesaid, unless the said road is completed from Fredericktown to the Minococy, and a Bridge over the Monococy is also completed by the whole amount of stock taken by said banks, and such individual subscriptions as may be made, and provided also, that if the said banks or either of them shall determine to take their said respective amounts of stock in the said Frederick and Harper's Ferry turnpike road, then their charters shall not be extended as aforesaid, unless the said road is completed as far as the Catoctin creek, together with a bridge over said creek with the funds subscribed by said banks, and such individuals as may also subscribe," for the purpose of inserting the following, to wit: "The road shall be continued from Rockville, in Montgomery county."

Mr. Nelson called for a division of the question, and the question was put on striking out as proposed, and determined in the negative.

The bill having been read throughout, and the question being about to be put on its passage. Mr. Nelson asked to be excused from voting, on the ground of his being a stockholder in some of the Institutions, interested in the passage of the above act, and he was accordingly excused. The question was then put, shall the bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follows:
