

Also, the supplement to an act for the benefit of Alfred H. Dashiell, and others of the city of Baltimore, passed at a December session 1826, chapter 163, endorsed, "will pass."

Mr. Rees from the committee made a favourable report upon the bill for the revaluation of the real and personal property, of Kent county. The said bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Harrison from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled a supplement to the act for draining the right prong of a branch in Queen Ann's county, known by the name of the Andover branch, reported the same, with the following amendment to wit.

Add the following at the end of the bill as an additional section, And be it enacted, that the third section of the original act, to which this is a supplement, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Which amendment was read and assented to.

The said bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill to authorise the judges of Montgomery county court to make sale of the land therein mentioned, the same being read a second time, Mr. Forrest offered the following as an amendment to wit.

Add the following as additional section, And be it enacted, that if the said court shall be of opinion that it is not advantageous to the said children, to sell any part of their real estate for the purposes aforesaid, they shall so certify to the Orphan's court of said county whose duty it shall be to direct a sale of such part of the personal estate of said children as shall be equal to the sum which they may think the said Arnold F. Winsor entitled to for the building aforesaid, which sum shall be paid to said Winsor.

The same having been read, the question was put, "will the senate assent to the same." Determined in the affirmative. Mr. Johnson moved to amend the bill as follows.

After the word "bond" in the 1st line 2d section, of the bill insert "with such security as the said court shall approve."

Mr. Heath then moved to lay the bill as amended on the table, and it was accordingly so ordered.
