

The bill to regulate the entering or recording satisfaction of any judgment or decree entered or rendered in any court of this state, was read a third time, when

Mr. Forrest moved to amend the same by striking out the preamble, which motion was assented to. The bill was then rejected.

Mr. Heath made an unfavorable report upon the bill relative to the fees of clerks and registers. The said bill was then read a second and third time by special order and rejected.

Mr. Dennis from the committee made an unfavorable report upon the bill relating to informers. Said bill was read a second and by special order a third time and rejected.

The bill for the protection of sheep in the several counties of this state and for other purposes, was read a second and by special order a third time and passed with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed.

1st. After word killing, line 2d, insert "or injuring."

2d. After word "sheep" 2d line, insert, "and the same shall be proved by oath or affirmation before a justice of the peace."

3d. Strike out 2d line, words "shall be proved by any person to have killed or injured any sheep that."

4th. Line 6th, strike out "the full" and insert, "double the."

Sec. 20. "And be it enacted, that all sheep belonging to the citizens of this State, shall be free from taxation for the term of five years from and after the passage of this act."

Mr. Herbert from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made a favorable report upon the resolution in favor of the representatives of Mary Richards, which was twice read by special order and assented to.

The bill to incorporate the Maryland Hospital, was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Heath offered the following resolution, which was twice read and ordered to be recorded for a third reading.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, that the Governor by and with the advice of the Council, be, and he is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a suitable person to take charge of and protect the public property belonging to the state in the city of Baltimore.

On motion of Mr. Herbert the senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill for the general valuation and assessment of property in this state.

Mr. Kennedy moved to lay the bill on the table. And the question was put and determined in the negative. When after some further reading of the bill, the Senate adjourned until tomorrow morning 9 o'clock.
