

By the Senate, March 14, 1828.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message requesting us to re-consider the bill entitled, An additional supplement to an act for the benefit of the University of Maryland, and we have accordingly re-considered the same and passed the bill, with an additional section, as an amendment thereto.

The bill to make valid the two deeds therein mentioned, was read a second, and by special order a third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution requiring the Governor and Council to transmit copies of a certain resolution in favor of the establishment of a naval academy at Annapolis, was read, assented to and sent to the house of delegates.

The senate took up for consideration the amendments proposed by the house of delegates to the bill to incorporate the Maryland Hospital; the said amendments were then read and assented to.

Mr. Kennedy delivered the following report which was read and concurred in:

“The committee to whom was referred a petition from sundry citizens of Washington county, praying that coopers may be permitted to make flour barrel hoops of grown timber, respectfully ask leave to report, that the committee are well aware of the importance of the subject referred to them, and would recommend that before any law pass on the subject, a few barrels of flour with hoops made of grown timber be sent on to the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of being examined by the shippers of and dealers in that article, and by another session the legislature will be enabled to act more correctly on the subject.”

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message, which was read:

By the House of Delegates, March 14, 1828.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have received your message of this day proposing an adjournment of the legislature to morrow, and the appointment of a joint committee to wait upon his Excellency the Governor, to invite his attendance at 11 o' clock in the senate chamber to sign the laws, and concur therein; and have named on the part of this house, Messrs. Goldsborough and Fitzhugh, to join the gentlemen named by your
