The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the relief of John T. Duryee, an insolvent debtor, of the City of Baltimore, rejected by the Senate yesterday, was returned to the House of Delegates.

The bill entitled, an act to abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the time and manner of electing the Senate, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body, so that each county and the city of Baltimore, may have a Senator to be elected immediately by the people, was read a third time, and the question put, "shall the bill pass."
