

Also, a resolution in favor of Andrew Slicer, messenger to the Senate, and John Quynn, doorkeeper to the house of delegates.

Which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

And a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act for the relief of Leah W. Hubbell, of Dorchester county, passed at December session 1818, chapter 68.

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Heath, Rees and Forrest.

Also, a resolution requiring the Printer's sheets of the Journal of Proceedings and Documents, of both branches of the Legislature remaining undelivered at the close of each session, and to be forwarded per mail, to the several members thereof respectively.

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Forrest, Kennedy and Sewell.

Also, a resolution in favor of Samuel Davis, of Baltimore city, a revolutionary pensioner of this state.

Which was read the first time and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Also, resolutions relative to the Tobacco Warehouses, in the city of Baltimore.

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Heath, Thomas and Smith.

And a bill entitled, an act relating to certain unsubsc^{ib}anted stock reserved for the state, in the Commercial and F^{anti}titu^{rs} bank of Baltimore.

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Heath, Smith and Forrest.

On motion of Mr. Heath, the engrossed bill entitled, an act to authorise certain alterations in the Court House of Baltimore county, was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Forrest, from the committee made an unfavorable report upon the resolution requiring the printer's sheets, of the Journals of Proceedings and Documents of both branches of the Legislature, remaining undelivered to be forwarded to the several members thereof.

The said resolution was then read a second time.

Mr. Thomas from the committee on ways and means in pursuance of the order of the Senate, this day adopted, reported the following message, which was read.
