

On motion of Mr. Harrison, the following order was read and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, the following order was read and adopted.

Ordered, That the Chief Clerk of the Senate procure for the use of each member, such newspaper as he may direct, equal to the price of one daily paper.

Mr. Sewell offered the following message, which was read and assented to.

By the Senate, December 29, 1829.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

The Senate have formed a quorum, and are ready to proceed with the business of the Session. We have chosen the honorable William H. ### WEDNESDAY, December 30, 1829.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday: the proceedings of yesterday were read.

The message adopted yesterday, informing the House of Delegates of the Senate being prepared to proceed with the business of the session, and the report from the Clerk of Charles county court, relative to the attendance of the judges of that court, were sent to the House of Delegates.

Mr. Forrest offered the following resolution, which was read the first time and laid on the table.

Resolved, That the Resolution passed at December Session, 1824, and numbered 49, relating to colleges, academies and schools, be, and the same is hereby repealed.
