

FRIDAY, February 12th, 1830.

The Senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday.

The bill, entitled an act to provide for the payment of witnesses summoned at the instance of the State of Maryland, and the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Robert Wilson, an insolvent debtor, a citizen of the state of Ohio, severally rejected by the Senate yesterday, were returned to the House of Delegates.

The bill entitled an act to incorporate the Baltimore Sugar Refining Company, passed by the Senate yesterday, was sent to the House of Delegates

On motion of Mr. Heath, the Senate proceeded to a third reading of the bill, entitled, an act to provide for the collection of the public revenue.

Mr. Heath moved to amend the bill by striking out the words 'it shall be the duty of the Treasurers on their respective shores, to employ,' in the 2d and 3d lines of the first section' and inserting in lieu thereof the following words, viz: 'the Attorney General for the time being, be, and he is hereby authorized and empowered, on the application of the Treasurer of either shore to designate and appoint;' which amendment was read—and after some discussion Mr. Lloyd moved, that the bill with the proposed amendment, be laid on the table. And the question was put, and determined in the affirmative.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a bill, entitled, an additional supplement to the act of December session 1827, chapter 117, entitled, an act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries, and others, which was read the first time, and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. And on motion of Mr. Kennedy, the said bill was ordered to be printed.

Also delivered the bill, entitled, an act for the relief of Washington Applebee, an insolvent debtor, heretofore rejected by the Senate, accompanied by the following message; which was read
