

act, entitled, an act to regulate the inspection of lumber with the following amendments, viz: amendments proposed: after the word, "and" in the last line but one of the bill, strike out the remainder of the bill, and insert the following: "such as are not merchantable, shall be marked as cullings or third quality," which amendment was read, and assented to. The said bill was then read a second time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Forrest appeared in the Senate.

Mr. Kennedy from the Committee on Divorces made a favorable report upon the bill, entitled, an act to divorce John Charles and Betsey Charles, of Talbot county. The said bill was then read a second time, and, after some discussion on motion of Mr. Lloyd, the said bill was laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Dennis, the Senate reconsidered the bill, entitled an act to incorporate a bank to be called by the name of the Bank of Salisbury. The bill having been then read,

Mr. Dennis moved to amend the same, by striking out the 3d section, which is in these words:

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That every subscriber shall pay to the commissioners who shall attend for opening the books, at the time of subscribing for the same, the sum of one dollar and twenty five cents in specie, on each share that shall be by him, her or them, subscribed; and each subscriber shall, within sixty days thereafter, pay to the directors of the said bank, the further sum of two dollars and fifty cents, and within sixty days thereafter the further sum of two dollars and fifty cents, and the remaining twenty-eight dollars and seventy-five cents on each share shall be paid by such instalments, and at such time as the directors shall appoint, upon giving not less than two months notice of such demand, in some newspaper published in Somerset county, and also in some newspaper published in Worcester county; provided, any such papers may be published in said counties, and if not, then by public advertisement set up at the most public places in the county, which may have no such paper, and which said demand or instalment shall not, at any time, exceed five dollars on each share; but any person who may find it convenient, may, at the time of paying his third instalment, pay upon his, her, or their shares, to the amount of twelve dollars and fifty cents, and shall receive a dividend accordingly"—for the purpose of inserting the following section in lieu thereof, as the third section, viz.

“Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That every subscriber shall
