

the orphans court of Montgomery county, severally endorsed "will pass." Ordered that the said bills be engrossed.

Also the bill, entitled, An act relating to the jail of Baltimore city and county, endorsed "will not pass."

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, the order submitted by Mr. Dennis relative to the publication of certain laws passed during the present session, was taken up for consideration and read a second time, when Mr. Kennedy moved the following as a substitute for the said order, viz.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the governor and council be and they are hereby requested to have published, without delay, in all the newspapers printed in Annapolis, Baltimore and Easton, once a week for three successive weeks, the following public acts which have been passed during the present session.

A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to prevent unnecessary accumulation of costs on all actions or suits at law in the county courts of this state, passed at December session 1829 chapter 116.

An act to abolish imprisonment for debt on certain judgments rendered by justices of the peace.

And an act, entitled. An act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers.

Which having been read, the question was put, Will the Senate receive the substitute? Determined in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Shall the resolution be engrossed for a third reading? Determined in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Dennis, the order submitted by him was withdrawn.

On motion of Mr. Forrest, the senate reconsidered the resolutions in favour of Elizabeth Dawkins and Mary Simpson, heretofore rejected by the senate, and they were recommitted.

Mr. Forrest, from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made unfavourable reports upon the resolution in favour of Elizabeth Dawkins, of Calvert county, widow of a revolutionary soldier, also upon the resolution in favour of Mary Simpson, of Allegany county.

The said resolutions were then severally read a second, and by special order a third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates, delivered the following message; which was read.
