A bill, entitled, an act for the shutting up of a certain part of Forrest-street extended, in the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Mayer, Montgomery and Osborn.

A bill, entitled, an act to repeal the third section of an act, entitled, a further supplement to the act, entitled, an act for the relief of sundry Insolvent Debtors, passed at December session, 1830; which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on Insolvency.

A bill, entitled, an act to Incorporate the Carmelite Sisters of Baltimore; which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs. Mayer, Sappington and Hughlett.

Mr. Dennis from the committee on finance to which was referred a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Sarah Foston, of Frederick county, reported favorably thereon. It was then read the second time.

The bill, entitled, an act supplementary to an act to provide for the payment of jurors in Harford county, passed at December session 1826, chapter 103; was read the third time as proposed to be amended, passed and returned to the house of delegates.
