By the Senate,

March 13, 1832.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message proposing to invite the governor to sign and seal the engrossed bills at 7 o'clock this evening, with a view to a final close of the session. We concur in the proposition to invite the governor to sign and seal the engrossed bills, but we propose to appoint 5 o'clock instead of 7, and we appoint Messrs. Chapman and Emory to join the gentlemen named by you to invite the governor to that ceremony. We further propose with your concurrence to bring this session to a final close to-morrow at 12 o'clock, M.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a preamble and resolutions relative to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, which was read the first time and referred to the committee on internal improvement.
