To commence this friendly intercourse the existing code of laws of this state shall be transmitted to you as soon as I have the honor of your permission to do so.

Your letter, enclosing the resolution of the legislature of Maryland, respecting the adjustment of a part of the boundary line between that state and the commonwealth of Virginia, was unfortunately not received until a few hours after the general assembly had adjourned. It will, however, be submitted to their consideration on the commencement of their next session; and the result of their deliberation on the subject transmitted to you.

Extract of a Message from Governor Stone to the Legislature of Maryland.

IN COUNCIL,

Annapolis, Nov. 18, 1796.
