

Mr. Wootton, from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to authorise and empower John H. Bayne of Prince Georges county, to sell and dispose of his negro woman Mary, who is a slave only for a term of years, beyond the limits of this state, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second, and by special order the third time passed and returned to the house of delegates.

12 o'clock having arrived, the senate proceeded to the election of a council to the governor. The ballot box was prepared, and the ballots deposited therein. It was then sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Montgomery and Hughlett, who were appointed by the senate to join the committee of the house of delegates, to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after a time returned and reported, that on examination of the ballot box, they had found there had been 87 votes given in all; of which John S. Martin had 71 votes, George C. Washington 77 votes, Gwynn Harris 71 votes,
