Gentlemen of the House of Delegates.

We have received your message proposing to recommend at 11 o'clock, instead of 12 o'clock, some gentleman to be commissioned by the Governor as Register of Wills for Kent county; and also some gentleman as Register of Wills for Calvert county, and we concur therein. We also have put in nomination James F. Brown, for Kent county, and James A. D. Dalrymple, for Calvert county. We have appointed Messrs Page and Montgomery to join the gentlemen named by your house to count the ballots and report the same.

Mr. Morris from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to exempt a part of Peace Alley in the city of Baltimore from the operation of the 16th section of the act of 1817, chapter 148, entitled, an act relating to the city of Baltimore reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

The President laid before the senate a communication from the treasurer of the western shore, made in obedience to the third section of the act of December session 1824, chapter 149.

Which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

11 o'clock having arrived, the senate proceeded to the election of Registers of Wills for Kent and Calvert counties. The ballot box was prepared, and the ballots deposited therein. It was then sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Page and Montgomery, who were appointed by the senate, conjointly with the committee of the house of delegates to count the ballots and report the result.
