with the Act for preservation of the Indians with
the Casquehaug Indians.

upon which was Enrolled and returned to
Lower house this vizt

First the Upper house desire to have the second
struck out of the Act (vizt) that the Lieutenant
Governor & Council have power to raise summe
for many Voluntaries

Secondly that former Clause provided that the
Lieutenant Governor and Council might employ any more
upon them their pay to be payed as with some of
six thousand pounds of tobacco

Thirdly that Clause provided also that not servt
be employed on such service without his or their
Masters or Mistresses consent.

This last Clause is thought unnecessary because
the officers that accept of the voluntaries for this
service can not tell which any person offers himself
as a Voluntary whether he be not a servt. Run
away from some Masters a force of hands for ma
