

in the woods & by night shall be found
mediate by the Indians & Crown the Indians
call and in case any Indian for meeting an
English man shall refuse to grow down
his arms upon call he shall be deemed an
Enemy,

4 That in case of any Indian stealing
of any thing shall be punished by the Indians
inviolably

5 That in case of Danger the Governor shall appoint
a place to which the Indians of the several
nations shall bring their wives & children to
be secured from danger of any Indian
of that in case the men of the several nations
shall remain here of not be servants to the
English

6 That if it shall be found that any Indian
of the several nations shall do any damage by
him done to the Crown or to any English
or to the Governor by the Indians
did willfully & wilfully do any such
crime & offence:

7 That the Indians of the several nations
upon the place where they now live of the
Hammon some to their last King or King of
the people immediately under the protection of
the People of the Province of subject to the
Indians whatsoever.

8 That John Robertson, & Thomas Mearns do pay
the Indians of the Province of one hundred
of Lewis by armed length of Reunob for the
Indian that was slain by them at the head of
Porter's Creek in August last year.

9 That every Indian that kills or steals
any goods or other goods, or other goods shall
undergo the same punishment that an English man
doth for the same offence

10 That the several nations of the Province shall continue
the places where they now live & that the
the Governor be desired to lay out the several
bounds as he him in justice shall seem most for
the public good between this of the last of
June next ensuing within which bounds it shall
not be lawful for the Indians to enter beyond
