 An ACT to prevent the Abuses, of concealing Convicted Felons, and other Offenders, im-  
 ported into this Province, and for the better Discovery of them.  
 A Supplementary ACT to the Act for relieving the Inhabitants of this Province, from some Ag-  
 grievances in the Prosecution of Suits at Law.  
 An ACT for the Repairing and Enlarging of the Church in the City of Annapolis; and for the  
 Building a Chappel of Ease in the Parish of St. Anne's in Anne-Arundel County; and to empower the  
 Raising and Levying a Quantity of Tobacco for that Purpose.  
 An ACT for the Payment and Assesment of the Publick Charge of this Province, for the present  
 Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty Eight.

All which the Governour passed into Laws, by Sealing them with the Right Hon. the Lord Pro-  
 prietary his greater Seal at Arms: And severally thus Indorsing them, viz. Nov. 2, 1728.  
 On Behalf of the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary of this Province, I will this be a Law.

Except the Act for Limitation of Officers Fees, of which the Governour would be advised: After  
 which the Governour was pleased to make the following Speech, viz.

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,

THE Session being now drawn to a Conclusion, my sincere Thanks attend the favourable Marks  
 of your Good-will towards me; in Return whereof, I can only promise the Continuation of my  
 Endeavours to promote your Welfare, which I trust the Blessing of the Almighty will enable me to  
 do. My Negative to the Officers Fees Bill, is Pursuant to his Lordship's positive Instructions

Joint Address this Day presented to me, I suppose is fully answered, by the Passing of  
 Tobacco Law, which I heartily wish may Operate to the Ease of the good People, by an  
 Amendment of the Staple. Let me earnestly Recommend to you, in your several Stations, a just and  
 careful Execution of all and all other Laws, now or heretofore made; 'Tis from the Execution  
 of Laws, and not from the Enacting them only, the Good of the People must arise. May Peace  
 and Plenteousness dwell amongst you; and as a free, easy, and flourishing People, Your securest  
 Establishment must be in a Steady Loyalty to the best of Kings, and in a faithful Duty to a most  
 indulgent Lord and Proprietor.

After which the Governour, with the Advice of his Lordship's Council; was pleased to Prorogue this  
 Assembly, to the Second Tuesday of March next.

Thereupon, Mr. Speaker, with the rest of the Members, return to the Lower House, where Mr  
 Speaker re-assum'd his Chair, and repeated what the Governour had done and said. Whereupon this  
 House accordingly prorogues it self to the second Tuesday of March next. So endeth this first Session  
 of Assembly this second Day of November, 1728.
