A Method of answering our Message, very strange to us, and which seems to preclude us from Reasoning with your House upon that Head; yer, considering how long this Session of Assembly, has already continued, and being willing rather to suffer in our private Interest, than to continue the Session longer, at the Publick Expence, we resolve to forbear any further Dispute about our Allowances, as a Council of State, at this Time; and defer it to the next Session of Assembly.
