An ORDINANCE for applying the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds Current Money, to the Purposes therein mentioned.

T is Ordained by his Excellency, and the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, that the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds Current Money, be paid by the Treasurer of the Western Shore, into the Hands of William Murdock, Edward Tilghman, and Thimas Ringgeld, Esquires; a Committee appointed by the Lower House of Assembly, to meet the Committees from the Houses of Representatives or Burgesses of the several British Colonles on this Continent, at the City of News-Tork, on the First Tuesday of October next; to consult together on the present Circumstances of the Colonies, and the Difficulties to which they are, and must be reduced, by the Operation of the late Acts of Parliament, for levying Duties and Taxes on the Colonies; and to consider of a general and united, dutiful, loyal, and humble Representation of their Condition, to his Majesty, and the Parliament, and to implore Relief; to be by them applied in, and towards the Expences attendant thereon; and that they lay an Account of their Disbursements before the General Assembly of this Province, as soon as conveniently may be; and that the Balance, if any, be by them returned into the Hands of the Treasurer.

Which was Read and Assented to, and Signed, by Order of the House, by the Honourable Speaker; and was sent to the Upper House, by Mr. J. Goldsborough, and Mr. Mackall.

Mr. Murdock, from the Committee appointed, brings in, and delivers to Mr. Speaker, the Report of the Resolves, drawn up by that Committee, for the Approbation of the House.

II. RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That it was granted by Magna Charta, and other the good Laws and Statutes of England, and confirmed by the Petition and Bill of Rights, that the Subject should not be compelled to contribute to any Tax, Tallage, Aid, or other like Charge, not set by common Consent of Parliament.

III. RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That by a Royal Charter, granted by his Majesty King Charles the First, in the Eighth Year of his Reign, and in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty-two, to Cacilius, then Lord Baltimore, it was, for the Encouragement of People to transport themselves and Families into this Province, amongst other Things, covenanted and granted, by his faid Majesty, for Himself, his Heirs, and Successors, as followeth: "And we will also, and of our more special Grace, for Us, our Heirs, and Successors, we do

" strictly enjoin, constitute, ordain, and command, That the said Province shall be of our

"Allegiance, and that all and fingular the Subjects and liege People of Us, our Heirs, and Suc-"cessors, transported, or to be transported, into the said Province, and the Children of them, and of such as shall descend from them, there already born, or hereaster to be born, be, and shall be Denizens and Lieges of Us, our Heirs, and Successors, of our Kingdom of England.
