By the COMMITTEE of CLAIMS.

YOUR committee having taken into their consideration the petition of Mary Triplet of Baltimore-Town, and the valuation of sundry tradesmen, what damage her houses sustained while occupied by the soldiers, beg leave to report, that the facts set forth in her petition appear to them to be true, and that although the valuation of damages done her houses, in their opinion, was at the time it was made very high, yet as materials and workmens wages have since that time greatly risen, they are of opinion it will not be more than sufficient to put her houses in proper repair, and that she ought to be allowed the whole thereof, amounting to two thousand seven hundred and twenty-four pounds seven shillings and six-pence, which they think will be a sufficient compensation for all rents and damages, and that the auditor-general be directed
