On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for recruiting the quota of troops of this state in the American army. ORDERED, That Mr. J. Hall, Mr. Chafe, Mr. Bayly, Mr. Lethrbury, Mr. Fitzhugh, and Mr. Bruff, do prepare and bring in the same.

The house adjourns till Monday morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, June 12, 1780.

THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

ORDERED, That the clerk of this house, as soon as may be, cause the several laws enacted under the present constitution and form of government, the votes and proceedings of the house of delegates, and the votes and proceedings of the senate, to be well bound and lettered in distinct and separate volumes, with blank leaves at the end of each for an index.

RESOLVED, That the expence thereof be defrayed by this state.

A petition of sundry inhabitants of Cæcil county, praying to be indemnified for losses sustained by the enemy, and to be released from the payment of taxes in consequence of such losses, was preferred and read.

A letter from Joseph Dashiell, Esq; lieutenant of Worcester county, relating to the restoring arms to sundry persons in that county heretofore taken from them; and a letter of excuse from Mr. Reed, for not attending on the 7th instant; were laid before the house and read.

The governor communicates to the house a letter from his Excellency general Washington of the 2d instant, and a circular letter from the committee of co-operation of the same date; which were read and referred to the committee appointed to bring in an additional supplement to the act for recruiting the quota of troops of this state in the American army.

Mr. Worthington brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report :

THE committee appointed to enquire what laws have expired or will expire during this session or at the close thereof, beg leave to report, that the following laws will expire at the close of this session : An act concerning nonjurors, passed July session 1779, and the supplementary acts thereto. An act to prohibit for a limited time the exportation of wheat, flour, rye, Indian corn, rice, bread, beef, pork, bacon, live stock, peas, beans, oats, and other victual, passed November session 1779. An act for enlarging the powers of the governor and council, passed November session 1779, and a supplement to the act, entitled, An act for enlarging the powers of the governor and council, passed same session. An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly, passed last session. An act to encrease the allowance of justices of the peace and jurymen, passed last session. An act relating to fines, forfeitures, and penalties, and to establish the allowance to witnesses and fees of constables, passed last session. All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house.
