So it was resolved in the affirmative.

Sent to the senate by Mr. M'Mechen and Mr. Worthington.

Mr. J. Hall brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to procure a supply of salt meat for the use of the army; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Cadwalader brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to suspend the act of assembly for making the bills of credit emitted by congress, and the bills of credit emitted by acts of assembly and acts of convention a legal tender in all cases, so far as the same relates to old debts; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the-table.

Thomas Stone, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker an address from sundry gentlemen in Baltimore-town, offering to form themselves into a troop of light-horse, at their own expence, for the public service, to act when necessary; which was read.

The bill to procure a supply of salt meat for the use of the army, was read the second time by especial order and passed. Sent to the senate by Mr. B. Hall and Mr. Norris.

The engrossed bills No. 16 and 17, were read and assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bills thereof, by Mr. Banning and Mr. Stull.

The house adjourns till 3 o'clock.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to enable Conrod Theodore Wederstrandt to draw orders as therein mentioned (the house, in the present instance, having dispensed with the resolve for admitting no new business). On motion, That a message be prepared to the senate, informing them, that the approach of harvest makes it absolutely necessary to bring the present session to a conclusion, and therefore that this house propose to rise to-morrow, and to adjourn to the third Monday in September next; the previous question was called for and put, That the said question be now put? Resolved in the affirmative.
