THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Weems. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Thomas Smyth, a delegate returned for Kent county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, took his seat in the house.

The message from the senate of yesterday, by Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esq; and the letters, &c. from the senate, by Matthew Tilghman, Esq; were read.

On further progression in reading the report from the committee to whom were referred the requisitions of congress, &c. the question was put, That the residue of the said thirty shillings be paid at two payments? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Chase seconded by Mr. Forrest, the question was put, That the first payment be on the 15th of April next? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Edwards seconded by Mr. Oneale, the question was put, That the second payment be on the first day of November next? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Forrest seconded by Mr. Chase, the question was put, That the second payment be on the 15th day of September next? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Forrest seconded by Mr. Chase, the question was put, That 25 shillings, part of the 30 shillings, be discharged in tobacco, wheat, or pork, at the actual value of those articles in specie? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Oneale seconded by Mr. Rowland appeared as follow:
