The engrossed bill No. 51, was read, assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bill thereof, by Mr. Norris.

On motion, ORDERED, That all business not determined can be referred to the next session of assembly.

On motion, ORDERED, That the bill respecting the debtors and creditors of this state under the act to establish funds to secure the payment of the state debt within six years, and for the punctual payment of the annual interest thereon, and the bill respecting the collectors of the public taxes since the first of January, 1783, be published in the Maryland Gazette and Baltimore Advertiser.

Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and William Perry, Esquires, from the senate, acquaint Mr. Speaker that the governor is waiting in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills, and requests the attendance of this house for that purpose.

Mr. Speaker left the chair, and, attended by the members of this house, went to the senate, and there presented the following engrossed bills to the governor, who signed the same and affixed the great seal thereto in presence of both houses.

No. 1. An act, entitled, An act to confirm an act, entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government as prevent a citizen from taking a seat in the legislature, or being an elector of the senate, without taking an oath to the support of this government, passed at November session, seventeen hundred and eighty-eight.

No. 2. An act to open a road from or near Christian Bower's mill, on Big Pipe Creek, in Frederick county, by Ox Moor's mill, on Patapisco falls, to intersect the great public road leading from Westminster-town to Baltimore-town.

No. 3. An act for the benefit of Barbara Hall.

No. 4. An act for the relief of William Robertson, of Montgomery, and Robert Amos, junior, of Kefford county.

No. 5. An act for the preservation of the breed of wild deer, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

No. 6. An act to ratify certain articles in addition to, and amendment of, the constitution of the United States of America, proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states.

No. 7. An act to straighten, amend and repair, the public road in Frederick county leading towards Carlisle, in Pennsylvania.

No. 8. An act to regulate the assize of bread.

No. 9. An act for the relief of Sarah Hall, of Baltimore county.

No. 10. An act for the benefit of Samuel Chase, of Baltimore-town.

No. 11. An act to repeal all those parts of an act of assembly, passed at February session, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, entitled, An act to punish certain crimes and misdemeanors, and to prevent the growth of toryism, which make it necessary to take, repeat and subscribe, the oath therein mentioned.

No. 12. An act to alter and amend that part of the public road leading from Port-Tobacco, in Charles county, to Leonard-town, in Saint-Mary's county, which lies between Allen's Fresh and File's creek.

No. 13. An act for the relief of Benjamin Rogers.

No. 14. A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of certain purchasers of confiscated property.

No. 15. An act for the draining of a marsh and branch, known by the name of the Long Marsh, lying in Queen-Anne's and Caroline counties.

No. 16. An act to enable certain commissioners to make partition of a tract or parcel of land called Bohemia Manor, lying in part within Cecil county of this state, and part in Newcastle county, in the state of Delaware, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

No. 17. A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the removal of the seat of justice from Charles-town to the Head of Elk, in Cecil county.

No. 18. An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act for securing the title of the proprietors of lots and houses in Charles-town, in Charles county, passed November session, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine.

No. 19. A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a market at the market-house in Chester-town, in Kent county, and for the regulation of the said market.

No. 20. An act to enable the justices of Saint-Mary's county court to assess a sum of money on the said county, for the support of an idiot, the child of Benjamin Bradburn, in the said county.

No. 21. An act to open a road from the great falls of Gunpowder, at a place known by the name of Mereditz's Farm, until it intersect the main road leading from Baltimore-town to York-town, in Pennsylvania, at a place called Burck's Old Field.
