William Tilghman and William Hindman, Esquires, from the senate, acquaint Mr. Speaker, that the governor is waiting in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills, and requests the attendance of this house for that purpose.

Mr. Speaker left the chair, and, attended by the members of this house, went to the senate, and there presented the following engrossed bills to the governor, who signed the same, and affixed the great seal thereto, in presence of both houses.

No. 1. An act to enable the court of appeals to continue certain causes depending in the said court.

No. 2. An act authorising certain commissioners to issue summonses for witnesses in the case therein mentioned.

No. 3. An act to settle and ascertain the salary of members of the council for the ensuing year.

No. 4. A Further supplement to the act for building a new church in the city of Annapolis.

No. 5. An act concerning Forest-street, in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county.

No. 6. A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to empower the justices of the peace of Charles county to assess and levy a sum of money on said county to repair their court-house and build a record-office.

No. 7. An act to enable the inhabitants of All-Faith parish, in Saint-Mary's county, to elect vestrymen and churchwardens for said parish, and for other purposes.

No. 8. A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for valuing the lot of ground in Upper-Marlborough, in Prince-George's county, on which the inspecting-house stands, and for paying the proprietor the value thereof.

No. 9. An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act to prevent and suppress insurrections.

No. 10. An act to confirm the proceedings of Kent county levy court.

No. 11. An act supplementary to an act, entitled, An act to erect and establish an insurance fire company in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, and for other purposes.

No. 12. An act to enable John M'Kim and John Brown, of Baltimore county, to convey certain lands to the uses therein mentioned.

No. 13. A Further supplement to the act to encourage the destroying of wolves.

No. 14. An act for the relief of certain foreigners who have settled within this state, further supplementary to the act for naturalization.

No. 15. A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act to restrain surveyors, to regulate certain proceedings in the land-office, and to compel the attendance of witnesses on surveys under the authority of the chancery, general, and county courts.

No. 16. An act to prevent abuses in making of bricks, and to ascertain the dimensions thereof, in Kent county.

No. 17. An act for the benefit of Jesse Fookes, of Worcester county.

No. 18. An act to lay out and open a road to and from the mill of Benjamin Lawrence and Elias Dorsey, on the western fork of Patapsco falls.

No. 19. An act to empower and authorise certain commissioners of Dorchester and Caroline counties to open a main road, and change the old road, which was formerly the division of the said counties, at the North-West Fork bridge, and the same, when so changed, to be the division of the said counties.

No. 20. An act to direct the mode of prosecution in certain cases.

No. 21. An act supplementary to an act, entitled, An act for the more effectual paving the streets of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, and for other purposes.

No. 22. An act to confirm an act to prohibit members of congress, or persons in office under the United States, from being eligible as members of the legislature or council, or holding offices in this state.

No. 23. An act to empower Jacob Green, of Prince-George's county, to sell and dispose of the personal property of Philip Green and Jacob Green, junior.

No. 24. An act to alter and change the name of Francis Hall, junior, of Queen-Anne's county.

No. 25. An act to extend the time for the late sheriff and collector of Queen-Anne's county to complete his collections.

No. 26. An act to open a road through part of Montgomery county.

No. 27. An act to extend the several streets in Baltimore-town therein mentioned.

No. 28. An act for the benefit of Judith Wallace, and her children, of Charles county.

No. 29. An act to enable George William West, of Baltimore county, to sell and dispose of the real estate of the late reverend William West, and for other purposes therein mentioned.
