**T**HE houſe met. Preſent the ſame members as on yeſterday. The proceedings of yeſterday were read.

Mr. Hollingsworth, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to lay a further tax on Cæcil county to complete the court-houſe, priſon and priſon yard, at Elkton; which was read the firſt and ſecond time by eſpecial order, and paſſed. Sent to the ſenate by the clerk.

Mr. Goldſborough, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report: THE committee to whom were referred the petitions of fundry inſolvent debtors, further report, that they have examined the petitions, counter petitions and vouchers, in the ſeveral caſes of John Nabb and Samuel Foudray, of Talbot county, Abraham George Hammond, of Baltimore county, John Savin and John Makin, of Cæcil county, and after due deliberation thereon, are induced to believe that the ſaid Nabb, Foudray, Hammond, Savin and Makin, are entitled to the relief prayed for, and that acts of inſolvency ought to be paſſed in their favour.

The committee further report, that they find, upon examination, that Lewis Duvall and Benjamin Davis Pen, of Montgomery county, John Southeron, of Queen-Anne's county, and William Simmons of Anne-Arundel county, have never publicly advertiſed their intention of applying to the legiſlature for acts of inſolvency; the committee are therefore doubtful whether acts of inſolvency ought to be paſſed in favour of the ſaid Duvall, Pen, Southeron and Simmons.

Mr. J. Johnson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, A ſupplement to an act for the valuation of the real and perſonal property within this ſtate; which was read the firſt time and ordered to lie on the table.

The report on the petition of John Welſh, was read the ſecond time, and the queſtion put, That the houſe concur therewith? Determined in the negative.

The bill to prevent vexatious and unneceſſary ſuits at law, is poſtpoſed till the next ſeſſion of aſſembly.

A petition from fundry inhabitants of the town of Salifbury, in Somerſet county, praying com-miſſioners may be appointed to lay out the ſaid town anew, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Carroll, Mr. Nutter and Mr. Waggaman, to conſider and report thereon.

On motion, the queſtion was put, That the bill to empower the viſitors of Eden ſchool, in Somerſet county, to diſpoſe of the property of the ſaid ſchool, and to apply the money to the pur- poſes therein mentioned, be poſtpoſed till the next ſeſſion of aſſembly?
