THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution respecting the bank stock, the resolution authorizing the governor and council to liquidate all claims against the estate of Samuel and John Hyde, the bill for the relief of Mary Sweeney and William King, the bill to encourage the establishing of a hospital for the relief of indigent sick persons, and for the reception and care of lunatics, the bill respecting the poor-house of Baltimore county, and the bill to authorize the Patowmack company to receive tolls on produce carried through the canal at the Great Falls, and for other purposes therein mentioned, were sent to the senate by the clerk.

ORDERED, That the report on the petition of Thomas Cockey Deye be referred to the next session of assembly.

The following message being prepared, was sent to the senate, with the bill authorizing Henry Stevenson, collector of Baltimore county, to complete his collections, by the clerk.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, JANUARY 19, 1798.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

WE consider the case of Henry Stevenson peculiarly hard, and hope you will be induced to reconsider the bill heretofore negatived by you.

The additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act relating to public roads in this state, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A memorial from Frederick Green, printer to the state, soliciting a loan of five hundred dollars, to enable him to purchase a new set of types for public use, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Wallace, Mr. Kerr and Mr. Sherwood, to consider and report thereon.

The amendments to the bill for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, were read the second time, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Wallace, from the committee, brings in and delivers to the speaker the following report: THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Frederick Green report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and are of opinion the prayer thereof ought not to be granted.

Which was read the first and second time and rejected.

Mr. Wilson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to the speaker the following report: THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Elizabeth Keech Cartwright, of Saint-Mary's county, report, that they have examined the same, and find the facts therein stated to be true, and beg leave to submit the following resolution:

Whereas it is represented by Elizabeth Keech Cartwright, of Saint-Mary's county, administratrix of John Cartwright, late of said county, deceased, that said Cartwright became security for one Richard Carnes to the state of Maryland for the purchase of confiscated property to the amount of nineteen hundred and fifty-nine pounds seventeen shillings and nine-pence halfpenny current money, bearing interest from the third day of October, seventeen hundred and eighty-one, and that the said Cartwright in his life-time paid to the state, as security for said Carnes, the sum of three hundred and sixty-nine pounds eight shillings and six-pence: And whereas the state's agent has taken back and sold the land for which the said Cartwright became security, and it appears from the said agent's account that there is still a balance
