THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The supplement to an act for amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, the resolution requesting the governor to transmit a copy of the law of last session relative to a turnpike road to the governor of Pennsylvania, the resolutions in favour of John Smith Brookes and Allen Quynn, and the message respecting the bill requiring the register of wills of Baltimore county to give daily attendance at his office, with the said bill, were sent to the senate by the clerk.

Mr. Harwood, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Charles Hammond, of Anne-Arundel county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to pay the civil list. ORDERED, That Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Quinton and Mr. Harwood, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Montgomery, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to streighten the road known by the name of The Black-horse Road, in Harford and Baltimore counties; which was read the first time and referred until the first day of June next.

On the second reading of the bill for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, the question was put, That the words "John J. Sothoron" be stricken out of the said bill? Determined in the negative.
