A petition from William Wilson and Patrick Magruder, of Montgomery county, praying that the treasurer may be directed to refund to them a sum of money paid into the treasury on an escheat warrant, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Swearingen, Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Selby, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. J. Bayly, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to regulate the removal of suits from the county courts to the general court, and to authorise the general court to allow the deposition of witnesses to be read in evidence in certain cases; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Ellicott, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the union insurance company of Maryland; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Stephen, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the vestry of St. Paul's parish, in Baltimore county, to draw a lottery within the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The speaker laid before the house a letter from the governor and council, enclosing the letters which they were requested to transmit by the resolution assented to by this house yesterday; which were read and referred to the committee to whom were referred the communications from the executive relative to the bank stock.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

T H U R S D A Y, November 29, 1804.

The bill for the benefit of Joyce Insley, of Dorchester county, was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Ellicott, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Chesapeake insurance company; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Petitions from John C. Luttig, Enoch Churchman, Benjamin D. Galpin, Alexander and James Fulton, of the city of Baltimore, Elisha Stansbury, of Baltimore county, and James Turner, of Talbot county, praying acts of insolvency, were preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.
