

Mr. Baer delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the drawing of a lottery in Frederick-town for the purpose of paving Market-street in said town; and Mr. Harryman delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay out a certain road in Baltimore county; which were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Worthington delivers the bill authorising doctor James Cocke to remove certain negroes into the state of Maryland, as amended; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. J. Thomas delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of William Brawner, of Frederick county, beg leave to report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and are of opinion that it would be unwise and impolitic to grant the prayer of the said petitioner, and that he have leave to withdraw his petition.

Which was read the first and second time by especial order and concurred with.

The bill to appoint trustees for Nathan Griffith, of Baltimore county, and for other purposes, was read the second time, and, on motion by Mr. Bland, the question was put, That the word "court" be inserted after the word "orphans" in the 10th line of the 3d page? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of the German or High Dutch Reformed Christian Church in Frederick-town, and other persons therein named, and the bill to confirm the title in Richard Flintham to a part of a tract of land lying in Cæcil county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Sellman delivers a petition from William Murray, of Anne-Arundel county, praying for a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Mr. Sellman, Mr. Tabbs, Mr. Worthington, Mr. A. Dorsey and Mr. Williams, to consider and report thereon.

On motion by Mr. J. Brown, ORDERED, That the supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the recovery of small debts out of court, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned, have a second reading on Friday next.

Mr. Palmer delivers a petition from Kitty E. Emory, of Queen-Anne's county, praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Mr. Palmer, Mr. Seth and Mr. Randall, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Kerr delivers a petition from Joseph Dawson, an old soldier; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

The house resumed the consideration of the resolutions disapproving of the resolutions of November session, 1808, relative to the embargo, and, on motion by Mr. J. H. Thomas, the question was put, That the following be inserted in the second resolution after the word "Resolved?" to wit: "that it is not the wish of the people of this state, and we do not now think it would be right, that the embargo should be again imposed, so as to deprive us of all commerce with other parts of the world, and to interrupt the free intercourse of trade between the different parts of our own country, for an unlimited time."
