So it was determined in the negative.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill authorising John M. Williams, late sheriff and collector of Saint-Mary's county, to complete his collection, the bill to lay out a road in Baltimore county, the bill for the benefit of the children of John Green, late of Dorchester county, deceased, the bill authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a building to be called The Baltimore Female Academy, the bill providing for the payment of the costs which accrued upon the trial of Thomas Burk, the bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to purchase a fire engine, and to erect a house with an alarm bell thereon, in the western precincts of Baltimore, and the bill to lay out, straighten and amend, a certain road in Harford county, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. J. S. Moffitt delivers a petition from Edward Foard, of Cecil county, praying a confirmation of his title to real property; which was read and referred to Mr. J. S. Moffitt, Mr. Physick and Mr. Groome, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Frazier delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Dorchester county, praying that a dwelling-house adjoining the court-house of said county may be purchased at the expense thereof; which was read and referred to Mr. Frazier, Mr. Griffith and Mr. Lecompte, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Bland delivers a memorial from Christopher Hughes, counter to the petition for an extension of the privileges already granted to the inspectors of tobacco in the city of Baltimore; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Forwood delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford county, counter to the petition for a road from the end of Thomas's lane to Stephen Rigdon's lane; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Archer delivers a petition from John H. Chamberlain, of Harford county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Mr. Archer, Mr. Davis and Mr. Streett, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Streett delivers a petition from Aquila Jones, and others, of Harford county, praying that said Jones may be compensated for damages sustained by a road through his land; which was read and referred to Mr. Streett, Mr. Archer and Mr. Davis, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Williams delivers a petition from Zachariah Duvall, collector of Anne-Arundel county, praying a further time to complete his collection; which was read and referred to Mr. Williams, Mr. Boyle and Mr. Sellman, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore and Frederick counties, praying for a turnpike road from the seventh milestone on the Baltimore and Reister's-town turnpike road leading to the town of Liberty, in Frederick county; which was read and referred to Mr. Harryman, Mr. Baer, Mr. J. H. Thomas, Mr. M. Brown and Mr. Randall, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Physick delivers a petition from John M. Coy, an old revolutionary officer; which was read and referred to the committee appointed on petitions of a similar nature.

Mr. Herbert delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Prince-George's county, praying the levy court may be elected by the people; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Chapman delivers the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred that part of the communications of the executive which relates to the repairs necessary to be made to the stadthouse, report, that they have duly attended to the subject matter submitted to them, and are of opinion, from the best observation they have been able to make, aided by the most correct information they could obtain, that immediate steps ought to be taken towards the preservation of the said building by painting, and making certain repairs indispensable to that object; they therefore recommend the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be requested, and they are hereby authorised and empowered, to employ some person to paint and make such repairs on the stadthouse as they may think essential to the preservation of the building, so far as the sum of _____ dollars may suffice for that purpose, and that they draw on the treasurer of the western shore for the said sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid, to be paid out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.
