

The bill authorising James Cochran to complete his collection, the bill authorising George W. So it was resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Bland delivers the following report :

THE committee to whom was referred the petition signed by John E. Howard, on behalf of the president and managers of the Baltimore and Frederick-town turnpike road company, report, that the memorial states, that the president and managers, in executing the trust reposed in them by the stockholders of said company, have erected a stone bridge over the river Monocacy at the expense of 48,000 dollars, and prays the legislature to pass a law, authorising them to collect a separate and distinct toll for crossing said bridge.

The committee view the law incorporating the Baltimore and Frederick-town turnpike road company as a contract between the public and the stockholders, in which, for certain privileges to them granted, to wit, the right to collect on all the capital stock expended in making the road, erecting permanent bridges over all the waters crossing said road wherever they should consider them necessary, with a right to pass through the farms, meadows, orchards and gardens, of any person, and in every direction. The company agree with the public to clear and open said road sixty feet wide, and not less than twenty feet thereof an artificial road, with a solid foundation, covered with gravel or pounded stone, and so nearly level as in no case to rise or fall more than four degrees upon a horizontal line. The president and managers, in prosecuting the contract, did exercise the power granted in the law, to expend part of the stock subscribed for making the road in erecting a permanent bridge over the river Monocacy, considering such bridge necessary; that having thus exercised the power, and built such bridge, being in their opinion necessary, they have but complied with the intent and meaning of the law, thereby entitling the company to exact tolls which will enable the managers to divide ten per centum upon the gross amount of capital expended in making said turnpike road. The committee therefore recommend that the memorialist have leave to withdraw the petition. All which is submitted.
